


LITTLE FREE LIBRARY

The Original Highlands is home to what very well might be the only "little library" specifically designated for German language materials in the country, according to its founder, Bridget Klein. Ms. Klein established the Louisville German Little Free Library in front of the Gralehaus at 1001 Baxter Avenue in November of 2020. Having been given a collection of German books but without the ability to meet inperson with interested fellow German speakers during the height of Covid, she came up with this idea in order to share the collection with others. After unsuccessfully approaching a few other locations with the idea, Ms. Klein thought of the Holy Grale and Gralehaus, and the owners of the Grales were happy to offer her space (recommending that she use the Baxter Avenue side of their property). They even donated the paint so that the library, constructed by Ken Tench, matches the paint of the Gralehaus. Mr. Tench built the library as a miniature version of the Gralehaus, complete with a miniature porch which, unfortunately, was a victim of accident or weather and is now in safekeeping with Ms. Klein. The library is dedicated to Irma Ford and Christa Steinbrenner, two woman from Germany who were active in the Louisville German community, sharing their knowledge of the language and culture with others, and who passed away as Ms. Klein was putting together the idea for the library.

Ms. Klein reports that the library has been well-used. She has even received donations from people from other states.



Materials have included German novels, magazines, newspapers, cookbooks, and Bibles, as well as coffee table books about Germany. She said that she has seen some make their way back to the library, as people take them and bring them back after reading them to share them with others. OHNA Architectural Spotlight

Back in 1893 the lot for this property was purchased, and construction was completed for a total cost of \$14,000 in 1895. Today that wouldn't cover the cost of one of the many beautiful stain glass windows. The architect was Chas. D Meyer, a prominent nineteenth century architect who designed many local landmark buildings.

This is a Gothic Revival church with an imposing tower. The gothic windows on the facade have brick voussoirs and stone surrounds. The use of brick corbeling is the major decorative technique. Trinity Lutheran was completed in 1895, making it one of the oldest, if not the oldest church in the Highland Neighborhood.

Today it is no longer used as a church. It was been renovated over the past years and is now used as a video production company and home.



PG&J'S DOG PARK BAR

A conversation with our feature business owner, Gina Nobles by Tess Collins

Tess: Tell us a brief history about PG&J's Dog Park Bar?

Gina: PG&J stands for our three rescue dogs: Paco, Ginnie and J Roddy. While living in Austin, TX my husband, Ben, and I belonged to a dog park bar. We loved watching our three dogs run and play while we enjoyed a cold beer or a nice cup of coffee. It was the best combination and entertainment for pups and humans. When we found

out we were moving back home to Kentucky, we knew we had to bring this concept back to the pet compassion city of Louisville.

Tess: What is unique about PG&J's Dog Park Bar?

Gina: What makes the dog park bar unique is that it combines an indoor and outdoor space where dogs and their owners can spend time together safely. Most individuals do not enjoy taking their beloved pups to public dog parks mainly for safety reasons. At PG&J's Dog Park Bar, every pup must be spayed/neutered, four months or older, friendly and show up to date vaccinations. We also have Bark Rangers that monitor the park to ensure everyone is playing safely. But what makes the dog park bar so special is the community we have built over the last two years.

Gina: As a Louisville native and UofL alum, I was familiar with the eclectic neighborhood of the Highlands. I remember thinking, anything this innovative would only be successful in the Highlands. The Highlands neighborhood is known to be quirky but inviting. The revitalization of the neighborhoods and downtown close to the Highlands was appealing as well. The Highlands is the densest neighborhood in the city and nearly everyone has dogs! We were proud to contribute to the community by injecting life back into a beautiful but neglected space in the heart of this neighborhood.

Tess: Can you tell us a little about your efforts to raise money for organizations that help dogs in need?

Gina: From the beginning, we wanted to make sure we gave back to our community not only in providing a safe space for all to enjoy but by helping to save lives and make an impact in the animal rescue community. We support five local rescue organizations by donating a portion of our sales each month. We host a variety of events with local rescue groups to raise money for their cause. We also accept in kind donations at the bar or through our website at www.pgjdogbar.com. Since we opened in January of 2021, we have donated over \$37,000.00. Our goal is to reach \$50,000.00 this year. We like to tell people at PG&J's Dog Park Bar, you are literally drinking for a cause.

Tess: Anything else you would like for neighbors to know?

Gina: We would like to thank the Highlands neighborhood for their support of our business. We would not be as successful if the people of the Highlands were not as welcoming and supportive of us when we started.




